This group grew closer and met nearly every day to listen to each other and to offer and receive advice about how to overcome the challenges of being a parent of a child with an autism spectrum disorder and how to support the teachers in their children’s classrooms. Over time, they began discussing that someone should form a parent and teacher’s organization for parents of children with special needs who require services from the school district, but who aren’t yet in kindergarten.

This organization is a vital resource for parents and teachers to share and to learn from one another. I am incredibly thankful for the tireless efforts of Dawn Dixon in the formation of this incredible organization.
